All are welcome at Center Church on the Common, an Open and Affirming UCC Congregation, where the Spirit of God stirs us to embrace our diversity, deepen our faith in Jesus, share our tears and laughter, and extend God's abundant love and justice into the world.

With Jubilation in my heart, I invite you to Emily Carle's Ecclesiastical Council on June 9th at 6pm here at Center Church. This is the final step before she can begin circulating her profile to be called to serve a church or agency in the United Church of Christ. Emily is graduating from Louisville Seminary on May 18 and will be heading home to CT for the summer. She has been an active member of Center Church since 2017, serving on the Outreach Team, was on the staff as a Youth Director, preached, and did a one semester internship.

You may not be familiar with an Ecclesiastical Council-below is an explanation:

Whereas the local church is the cornerstone for the life and ministry of the entire United Church of Christ, the Ecclesiastical Council is the representative, deliberative body made up of delegates from the local churches in the Association and all authorized ministers holding standing in the Association. In the Hampshire Association, each local church is entitled to be represented by four lay delegates. Ultimately, it is the Association, often through its Ecclesiastical Council, that grants or removes official standing in and on behalf of the entire United Church of Christ to all local congregations and authorized ministers-ordained, licensed, and commissioned, as well as for those who are in the discernment process pertaining to authorized ministries.

Ecclesiastical Councils are convened for the purpose of examining and authorizing persons for ordination and Privilege of Call. Privilege of Call is the term used when an ordained minister of another denomination desires to enter the ordained ministry of the United Church of Christ. When a candidate for ordination or Privilege of Call has successfully completed the examination by the Association's Committee on Church and Ministry, the next step in the approval process is an Ecclesiastical Council, which may be held before or following the point at which the candidate has received a call to an ordained ministry position recognized by the Association.

The Association's Committee on Church and Ministry arranges for an official meeting of an Ecclesiastical Council and decides with the candidate what type of presentation the candidate will make to the Ecclesiastical Council and how all or a portion of the candidate's paper will be made available to the delegates to the Ecclesiastical Council.

We will provide a copy of Emily's ordination paper for you to read. Two representatives and I will vote, but any of you are welcome to attend and even ask questions. Can you imagine how Emily may feel? She can handle it!

Other questions you may have? What's a profile? It's a "resume" for those applying to serve churches, hospitals, college campuses, and other areas affiliated with the United Church of Christ. The profile asks one applying to lists their strengths and weaknesses, how God is calling them, and what kind of community they wish to serve. It's a lengthy process to complete with references.

A reception will follow. Please join us and support Emily.

News from the Trustees for May 2024

At the trustees meeting in April, we learned that our operating income stood at 23.85% and operating expenses stood at 28.43% of the 2024 budget, very close to the 25% we should be at for end of March. We anticipate that the April figures will include our first investment interest check for 2024. Our investment income did very well in March and showed a lovely gain. The change from Wells Fargo to the UCC Funds has been a very good move! The new Park St. outer Fellowship Hall door has been replaced and the final installation work will be complete when you are reading this. When completed, both doors will be ADA compliant. The Activities team is appreciatively thanked for the seed money to get this work done. We also heard reports about upcoming building use, what Lori has been up to, a couple of old business items, and some new business. We want to thank former trustee and safe church coordinator, Al Duffy, for agreeing to meet with both trustees and deacons to go over our guidelines for keeping us safe during our worship services. We look forward to hearing about the spring tea, sponsored by the Activities folks this month.



From the Church Historian – May 2024

Rev. Dr. Jesse Gilman Nichols 1869-1935


The Rev. Dr. was our pastor for nearly 40 years! He came to Center Church in 1906 and preached and cared for our congregation until 1935. Rev. Nichols was born in Amesbury, MA on August 27, 1869. His parents were Joseph Warren and Maria Augusta Ricker Nichols. He graduated from Harvard in the Class of 1891 and went on to get his masters in 1892 from Harvard Divinity School. He completed his theological studies from Andover Theological Seminary in 1894. On September 5, 1894 he married Sarah Isabel Chase of Cambridge, MA. Her

parents were Albert and Sarah March Goold. Sarah became the organist and choir director for our church. He and Sarah resided at 33 College

Street. Their daughter Isabel graduated from Mount Holyoke College in 1918 and she went on to become a college music department director.

Rev. Nichols did one year of church related work (1893) in Springfield, ME. Then from 1894-1906, he preached at a church in Hamilton, MA. There he served as a trustee of the public library for 10 years. Those years

in Hamilton gave him the background to be called to Center Church in December 1905. In January1906, he was unanimously accepted to become our pastor and was installed on April 17, 1906! In May 1908, he helped to celebrate the 175th Anniversary of our church. He became an active member of the Holyoke Ministers Association, member of the National Council of Congregational Churches at Cleveland, OH and he also attended the International Council of Churches in Bournemouth, England.



In 1927, Rev. Nichols helped to form Center Church as the First Church, Inc. In 1929, Mount Holyoke College conferred on Rev. Nichols, who was a trustee of Mount Holyoke, the Honorary Degree of Doctor of Letters. He was an active participant in the redecoration of our sanctuary in 1931. He also presided over our 200th Anniversary in March (10-12) 1933!

The Rev. Dr. was "beloved by all people of faith in our community." He gave "untiringly of his time and strength" to the duties of our church and the ministry throughout the entire

village. He worked closely with the many confirmands. During WWI he kept in touch with the servicemen from our village. He was an "avid reader with a passion for facts and enjoyed playing baseball." He and his family enjoyed vacations on Nantucket where his daughter played the organ for the local church. Rev. Nichols died on July 1, 1935 from a two-week long illness. He is buried in Merrimac, MA. Rev. Dr. Nichols was considered a "great soul and dignified person."

Tell Me the Stories - May 2024

I Was There to Hear Your Borning Cry (NCH 351) was first introduced to us by Kate Baker-Carr, one of our associate ministers in the late 80s and early 90s. The author and composer is John Ylvisaker, born in 1937. He wrote the hymn in 1985, and it was written "in the first person as though the singer is the voice of God speaking to confirmands." His father was a Lutheran pastor on the faculty at Concordia College and his mother was the college librarian. He has one collection of 500 hymns and songs called <u>Borning Cry</u> which was published in 1992, as well as a number of other collections. The actual hymn tune name is "Borning Cry," although in some new hymnals it is entitled "Waterlife." While he is a versatile musician, able to play many instruments, Ylvisaker especially likes keyboards, flute and guitar. When giving workshops here in the US, he also plays historic instruments and African drums. It is said that this is his best known song. *CAC* 2/07

I have only written about *Lord, I Want to be a Christian* (NCH 454, PH 353) once even though it does appear in both our hymnals. This African American spiritual was transcribed in 1927 by R. Nathaniel Dett and sung by the Hampton Institute chorus starting in 1930. Did you know that the tune can be played on the piano just using the black keys? The <u>NCH Companion</u> says that it has two meanings: (a) "a simple song of longing for the Christian faith and underlying that (b) a commentary on insincere people who treat others with brutality." The anonymous tune "I Want To Be A Christian" comes from the first line of the text. *CAC* 10/19

Like the Murmur of the Dove Song (NCH 270) actually appears in the Pentecost section, but we sang it on April 28. The text was written specifically for this hymn tune by Carl Daw, Jr. in 1982. It covers the "how," "where," "to whom," and finally "why" the Holy Spirit comes. Daw received his degrees from Rice (bachelor), UVA (masters and doctorate), and finally a theological degree from the Univ. of the South. He is an ordained Episcopal priest. Daw's name appears with ten NCH hymns. Peter Cutts originally composed "Bridegroom" for one of Erik Routley's texts, at Routley's request. The tune has been used for several newer texts as well. Cutts came from Birmingham, England, received his education there and taught music in Wakefield, England before he moved to the US. Routley encouraged him to compose hymn tunes. The tune is used with one other NCH hymn and Cutts has three other tunes in the NCH. *CAC* 6/15
